OPTION A:

WHAT IS SPIRITUALITY?*

OPTION B:

PASTORAL / PRACTICAL THEOLOGY: ITS CHALLENGES AND IMPLICATIONS FOR MINISTRY

Week 2: 15-19 June

OPTION A:

CONTEMPORARY ISSUES IN MORAL THEOLOGY

A selection of topics within Fundamental Moral Theology will be covered during the first two days of the Summer School, and participants will then be introduced to a number of ethical problems within Applied Moral Theology in the latter part of the week. Key topics include: Natural Law Theory, Conscience, Moral Responsibility, Euthanasia, Human Rights, Just War Theory, and Business Ethics.

OPTION B:

IGNATIAN DISCERNMENT TODAY

We will explore the dynamics of Ignatian discernment both in their origins and in their current application. The setting for Ignatius and his companions in 1539 was an ideal one; yet we will see that today, in a variety of settings, these dynamics have much to offer in the making of better decisions. The process will include inputs, personal reflection, case studies and sharing.

Week 3: 22 - 26 June

OPTION A:

FAITH and CULTURE

How does Christian faith intersect with culture? This question will be explored from a variety of perspectives: theological, anthropological, pastoral and aesthetic. Topics include: faith and social responsibility, secularisation and the public face of religion, understanding Jesus Christ today, gender and culture, faith and the visual arts, and ministry and culture.

OPTION B:

THEMES IN CANON LAW*

Dr. Frank Morrissey OMI, Saint Paul University, and Mgr. Gordon Read will present canonical themes such as "Whither the Parish?" and the Diocese/Parish/Religious Institute as the custodian of the temporal goods of the Church. Dr. Morrissey is a well-known canon lawyer who advises Conferences of Bishops/Diocesan Bishops/Religious Institutes on canonical matters. Until recently, he was also a consultant to the Holy See. Mgr Read is a well-known canonical commentator. He has fulfilled roles such as Chancellor and Judicial Vicar of the Diocese of Brentwood, England, as well as Parish Priest.
